STUDENT ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

LINCOLN LECTURE

Justin Webb, formerly the BBC North America Editor and now a Radio 4 Today presenter visited the College on Thursday, 4th February to give the 2010 Lincoln Lecture "Have A Nice Day": British Perceptions of American Society". His was an engaging presentation, blending anecdote with penetrating insight into the way in which we see our American "cousins". A capacity audience of students, staff, parents and friends of the College felt privileged to have benefited from Mr. Webb's experience on both sides of the Atlantic. Year 13 student Rowan Callinan gave an accomplished Vote of Thanks. Mr. Webb left for London after dinner and was bright and cheerful on the radio again by six o'clock the next morning!

The Lincoln Lecture is now firmly established as a highlight of the College calendar. It not only enables students to attend a lecture given by a first class speaker but also provides a high profile and lively way of commemorating the College's unique heritage and links with the United States.

LEADERSHIP IN THE SIXTH FORM FROM SEPTEMBER 2010

The College Sixth Form will reach its capacity of approximately 440 students next year of whom over 200 will be boarders. Given this scale of operation, the Governors have decided that the current role filled by Mr. Glover should be split and whilst he will continue as Vice Principal (Director of Sixth Form) with overall responsibility for the Sixth Form, the role of Head of House of Lincoln Hall will be offered to another member of the teaching staff. The post is being advertised nationally as well as internally and an appointment will be made in early March.

This development will enable us to improve still further the already outstanding experience enjoyed by our Sixth Formers, both day students and boarders. An announcement about the new appointment will be made as soon as possible.

ADMISSIONS POLICY 2011

In accordance with the timeframes laid down in the schools Admissions Code, the formal period of consultation regarding the draft Wymondham College Admissions Policy 2011 ended on 15 January 2010. The Governing Body met on 5 February 2010 to agree the Policy. This is now available on the College website. The proposed change to the fourth oversubscription criteria for day places was rejected so this will remain as it is in the current Admissions Policy i.e. the fourth oversubscription criteria for allocation of day places will be on the basis of proximity. The consultation process for the 2012 Admissions Policy will start in November 2010.

Signing in between 7.00pm and 8.00pm on Sunday in full school uniform

(Exceptionally between 8.00am and 8.20am on Monday – with Head of House approval, in full school uniform)

Signing out between 4.15pm and 5.00pm

- Weekend Leave

Only with Head of House approval and submitted by preceding Tuesday 8.30am

(First w/e in Autumn Term – no Weekend Leave for Y7s to Y10 inclusive)

Signing in between 7.00pm and 8.00pm on Sunday

(Exceptionally between 8.00am and 8.20am on Monday – with Head of House approval)

Signing out between 12.00 noon and 12.30 pm Saturday

Boarders are collected 30 minutes later than Day students at the end of full, half terms and exeats in order to help reduce the traffic congestion on site and in Golf Links Road.

At each return from a College recess, and after Boarders have taken weekend leave, Head of House will call parents/carers if a Boarder has not arrived back beyond an hour of their expected return time.

BIG WEEKENDER PROGRAMME UPDATE

The next Big Weekender is on Saturday 27th and Sunday 28th February 2010. We invite all boarders to stay in for these weekends and share in the activities planned.

TRAFFIC AND THE COLLEGE BUS SERVICE

The College Estate Staff recently carried out a risk assessment with Eastern Counties Health and Safety staff about the pick up and drop off point that the Bus Service currently uses in the Lincoln/Kett car park. The assessment concluded that continued use of that area for students to access and depart from the Bus carries a substantial risk of an accident due to the way other vehicles use that area. As a result, the College has been left with no other option than to ensure that the Bus picks up and drops off at the front middle entrance bus stop beside the roundabout. This means that parents who park their cars on the double yellow lines around the roundabout will restrict the bus operation so it is requested that this practice ceases. The use of the front entrance for the Bus will start on Monday 22 February 2010.

The frustrations of the traffic problems we have at the College are well-known and I am currently working with traffic engineers to develop plans and costings as to how we might address this issue. However, in recent end of terms/Exeat Fridays the Estate staff, when trying to ensure that traffic flows safely and swiftly, have received verbal abuse from a very small minority of parents. This is clearly unacceptable. The Estate staff have a difficult job as it is at these times and receiving verbal abuse does not make the job any easier.

THE MAIR CUP 2010

One thousand people waited expectantly in the Sports Hall on Sunday 7th, February for an evening of “inspiring music, faultless dedication and unmissable entertainment” that we have all come to fondly know as The Mair Cup. In introducing the evening, Mr Day speculated whether or not Fry could repeat their historic win from last year. He was also surprised that one House’s preparation for the competition was so intense that it required a special ‘Waitrose’ diet!

The Judges were very impressed with the quality and sheer number of excellent individual musicians on display and, consequently, awarded a record number of Commendation Certificates this year. Two Commendations were awarded for Kett’s Instrumental Ensemble. One was awarded to James Myers for his flute playing and another to Penelope Carter for her arrangement. Cavell Hall was awarded 4 Commendation Certificates for performers in both the Instrumental Ensemble and Small Ensemble. Mollie Narayn picked one up for her directing and violin playing. Robert Peck took another for his virtuosic Saxophone improvisation. The last two went to Georgie Hoare for her arranging skills and vocals and Tim Weber for his vocals and charisma. New Hall was noted in the Commendation prizes for three of their male singers in the Small Ensemble – Jack Evans, Harry Evans and Matt Nelson. Kett won the best Small Ensemble prize with their arrangement, by Felix Faire, of *Butterfly* by Mia Makaroff. The Judges acknowledged that this was the best performance of the evening.

New Hall claimed the Instrumental prize with another composition from Tom Richardson and Marcus Verrell entitled *Jam Origins*, following on from their success in the previous year. The Judges loved this piece for the quality of the ensemble playing and the atmosphere created with a bedside lamp. Fry took the best Large Choir certificate with *Never Forget* by Take That. Kati Lines was deservedly awarded a commendation certificate for her accompanying of all of Fry’s entries on keyboards.

New Hall, under the direction of Charlotte Evans and Tom Richardson, won the Mair Cup trophy overall because the judges felt that, out of all the Houses, they produced three consistently good performances on the night. If this was not enough, the evening had a special additional extra in the interval when all the Music Captains performed their rendition of REM’s classic *Everybody Hurts* to help those whose lives have been devastated in Haiti. The generous donations of our packed audience came to £500, which I am sure will be warmly received. It is not only good to think that so many people had such an enjoyable evening here in Norfolk, but a lot of good came out of it for those in need further afield.

RE DEPARTMENT

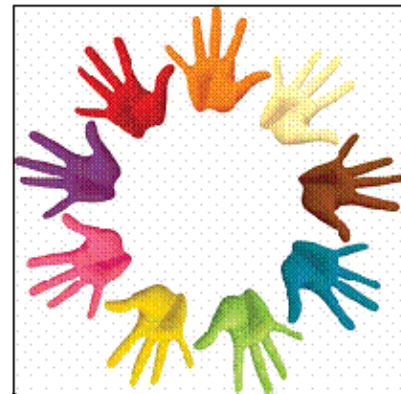

They appreciated the chance to try an ice breaker quiz and to watch video advertisements devised by young people and featuring Bear Grylls.

CITIZENSHIP DEPARTMENT

The College observed Holocaust Memorial Day on Wednesday January 27th, raising awareness of genocide and how it starts in small ways and has given rise to examples from all over the world and still threatens peace today.

Nathan Woolley Y13 went to the Lessons from the Auschwitz project last year and was interviewed by Radio Norfolk, where he talked about what the College was doing.

Y11 drama students with Mrs Foreman performed their own thought provoking piece on prejudice against the Jews today and in the past. It was seen by 10 classes of older students. Ms Gray in the geography department enjoyed giving her students a taste of discrimination. Some students may be composing songs in music based on the theme. Tutors supported the day and encouraged students to think about the issues and to wear hands.



To fit in with this year's logo of different coloured hands, students marked the day: by wearing two paper cut-out hands, one on each lapel, one with their school number on, the other with their name.

In the morning or for one lesson, teachers used numbers only (as this is symbolic of dehumanisation) when talking to students, and their name in the afternoon.

At the end of the day, or at lunchtime, students came to the Humanities block to stick their paper hands in the corridors near the Citizenship classroom, H3, to remain as a reminder of the theme for the day.

The wall outside H3 is now exploding with hands, numbered and named, to act as a reminder that the future of this world is in our students' hands.
